Message from the Mayor

Greetings to the residents and visitors of Baptiste Lake and area. As I write this article in early March winter is very much still with us. But we know that spring is just around the corner and the annual ritual of "opening the cottage" will be celebrated shortly.

It is much the same with the Municipality. The winter months are quieter, with hockey, curling, skiing and snow removal being the biggest concerns. But with spring comes a flurry of activity, especially with road maintenance. Frost heaves, ditching, plugged culverts, flooding and potholes are some of the common issues we can expect.

In December 2024, Council passed a Capital Budget of \$4.5M, including over 9 km of paving on Mink Lake Road, all totally funded by the municipality. In late March 2025, an Operating Budget of approximately \$13.5M will be passed, ensuring the smooth operation of all departments within the municipality. With all the financial challenges we have faced, including inflation, higher interest rates, continued MPAC freeze on assessments, a 22% increase to our OPP bill, union negotiations and no infrastructure funding from the province, I am pleased to report that we were able to do all this with a municipal property tax increase of only 4.7%.

We are happy to partner with the Hastings Highlands Interlake Association, Bancroft Area Stewardship Council and Watersheds Canada on some lake health initiatives. As a lake-based economy, we plan on working with these partners to deliver free educational workshops for the waterfront



community and offer free bundles of native species plants to have a positive impact on the health of the lakes and their ecosystems in Hastings Highlands. Stay tuned for further information on this program and please get involved!

The HHPL staff gave many hours to the organizing of this event as well as the Trustees of the Board. A great deal of hard work paid off.



Baptiste Lake Dam Repairs Completed

The Ministry of Natural Resources has successfully completed the planned refurbishments to the Baptiste Lake Dam. As detailed in the previous Spring and Fall Newsletters, the repairs included the following:

- West Abutment Extension: A small section of the existing west abutment was extended and raised by 0.5 meters to prevent water from flowing around the dam during periods of high run-off.
- Stoplog Sluiceways: Each of the four stoplog sluiceways had a temporary cofferdam installed upstream to facilitate the full replacement of the ...continued on page 9

stoplogs. Additionally, the sluiceways and the low flow valve chamber underwent abrasive concrete blasting, concrete crack injection, and concrete resurfacing while the cofferdams were in place.

- Trash Rack Replacement: The trash rack, which prevents debris from entering the low flow valve chamber, was replaced.
- Overflow Weir Resurfacing: The most visually notable refurbishment was the resurfacing of the overflow weir. This involved abrasive blasting and chipping of unsound concrete, crack injection, rebar installation, and pouring a 15 cm thick concrete surface along the downstream side of the wingwall.

To facilitate the repairs to the overflow weir, the MNR scheduled the work for late summer when water levels would normally be below the height of the overflow weir. This scheduling aimed to minimize impacts on natural resources and recreational users.

The successful completion of these refurbishments will maintain functionality of the dam while also extending the service life of the existing structure.

BILL CHESHIRE DECEMBER 18, 1944 – DECEMBER 19, 2024

It is with deep sorrow that we announce the sudden passing of William "Bill" Cheshire. He left this world at the age of 80 due to complications from heart surgery. He was surrounded by his loving family at his side. We will always remember his smile, warmth, generosity and jovial sense of humour.

He is survived by his wife of almost 55 years, Joan Cheshire, and his loving children Greg (Larisa), Kevin (Meggie) and

Carolyn (Brian) and by his seven grandchildren Norah, Emily, Ally, Tommy, Sammy, Abigail and Ben.

Bill graduated from the Wiarton high school to go on to the Ivey Business School at Western University and a long career in Human Resources with various companies. During his career, he remained very active in many charities and Boards. Most recently he enjoyed volunteering at The Compass Food Bank, as well as helping in local government issues. He provided a scholarship award annually to the Wiarton High School which will continue after his passing. He also had a great love of history. He spent a significant amount of time documenting the history of families in the Bruce Peninsula

and was published posthumously in the Bruce County Historical Society's 2025 Yearbook.

Further to the above Obituary, as it appeared in the Wiarton Echo, Bill was involved over many decades as a member of the Baptiste Lake Association. His love of the lake was evident in the many articles that he wrote and submitted to the Bancroft Times concerning issues impacting the lake, plus his involvement in the High Falls Water Management Plan in and around 2007. Bill, Kan Chhatwal, Norman Jull and many others

expended many hours voluntarily to secure the correct information and action to safeguard the Water Management Plan for Baptiste Lake. He was very vigilant in making himself aware of the bylaws and other Municipal business. Not much escaped his attention to the benefit of lake residents. A member of the BLA for many years, he was actually in attendance at the Corn Roast in September 2024 as well as at the Hastings Highlands Interlake meeting last June.

A generous contributor over the years to the Hastings Highlands Public Library, we are grateful for all Bill's concrete efforts in making our area a better place to live. As many before him, he will be greatly missed.

For non "Central Canadians", the term "cottage" may be a bit of mystery or even a misnomer. If you are thinking Anne Hathaway's Tudor cottage covered with climbing roses, you are way off base. In fact, the term doesn't seem to be used much outside of Ontario, where the term "cottage country" means any place on any lake north of Toronto. (There are a lot of them; over 250,000 lakes in Ontario). In the west, they are referred to as "cabins", in Quebec as "chalets"—and in Russia, "dachas", or so I am told. They can be rustic, water-access by canoe only simple abodes with outdoor plumbing or they can be multi-million homes on places like Lakes Rousseau or Joseph in the Muskokas, with every kind of cottage toy (ski boat, sea-doos, inflatable floating bouncy castle etc) imaginable. For those fortunate enough to own a cottage—and it is not a small number—many have been in the family for several generations (and will now likely attract a higher capital gains tax when they are passed on to the children, given recent budget changes. So much for any new rules affecting only 0.13 percent of Canadians). But cottage life is also embraced by new Canadians and some are even rented out (God forbid) on platforms like AirBNB.

In my case, our cottage is located in the Kawartha Highlands, Canadian Shield country between the towns of Bancroft and Haliburton. We can drive there on washboard dirt roads. There is hydro (most of the time) but very limited cell coverage. If you walk down the road, and stand on a particular rock in the evening, it usually works. We used to have a landline and dial-up Wifi but it was so slow we gave up, and then the phone company cancelled the "cottage line suspension service" we used to use in the winter. Because, you see, like many cottages, we close up for "the winter" (which generally means between Canadian Thanksgiving in early October and Victoria Day weekend in late May). The power is shut off, the pipes drained, the dock lifted and everything is closed up to await the minus 30C temperatures that sometimes arrive in Jan-Feb.

So what does this have to with ©? Well, you can't escape it, even up here at the lake. Whether it is the \$4.99 DVDs we buy at the local supermarket for those inevitable rainy days or the ubiquitous copyrighted board games (Scrabble, Clue, Cranium, you

name it) that get trotted out, the © symbol is everywhere. Cottage country must be the last stand of the DVD, and a lot of low grade Hollywood movies and series that you have never heard of seem to arrive on the shelves of the local Foodland for bored cottagers. But there is no cable and no streaming, so if you want to watch something in the evening, get out the old DVDs. At our place, Bugs Bunny and Tom and Jerry cartoons, dating back to the 1950s and beyond, are still popular as a new generation discovers them, but beware of piracy. One young visitor, having seen the scary FBI warning at the beginning of a Bugs DVD, asked what piracy was because, as she said, I don't want to go to jail for 5 years or pay a fine of \$250,000.

And then there are the card games, many of them, like cribbage, having been invented a couple of centuries ago. But the Bicycle "Official Rules of Card Games", first copyrighted in 1887 (our edition is a relatively recent 2006) is indispensable. While the rules of a game (i.e. the mechanics) cannot be protected by copyright—although artwork and design unique to a specific game could be—Bicycle's edition of the rules is copyrighted

because of its editorial content, organization, etc.

The local paper, the Bancroft Times (founded 1894) has its own copyrighted copy. You won't find Canadian or Associated Press articles here. You will find a blowby-blow description of the local Council meeting where Council wrestled with the thorny problem of the arena's deficit and whether to impose user fees on residents of outlying municipalities that were refusing to pay their share of operating expenses. This seems only fair, except the problem arises from the disincentive caused by user fees. If it stops the kids from outside town from using the arena, there won't be enough players for the hockey league. Thorny local issues. This made me reflect on some of the big journalism issues of the day, such as the OpenAI v New York Times lawsuit concerning OpenAI's unlicensed use of NYT content to train its Artificial Intelligence (AI) algorithm. This made me wonder if the Times' (the Bancroft Times, that is) coverage of Bancroft Town Council's meeting would be scooped up by OpenAI's AI machine. We hear that AI has an insatiable appetite for data, in fact that within a year or two there may be such a shortage of data for AI training that AI may have to produce its own synthetic data. If there is a data drought, no doubt content in the Bancroft Times will be as important to OpenAI as the content it has purloined from the New York Times.

Another manifestation of AI is the use of copyrighted artwork and photos to produce new AI-generated content. A couple of years ago, while gazing at the lake from the dock, I read about DALL E-2, one of the earlier AI programs that could produce images on demand. I created one using the scenery I was enjoying, titled "Autumn foliage, with Muskoka Chairs in the style of Monet", to illustrate my blog on "AI and Computer-Generated Art: Its Impact on Artists and Copyright".

Whether it is broadcasts from "The Moose" (Moose FM Radio, officially known as CHMS-FM), content from the local newspaper, the "Think Turtle Conservation Initiative" that sells signs, decals, and fridge magnets to raise awareness of turtles crossing the road, or information from the local lake association or Fish and Game Club, the integrity of content is protected everywhere by copyright—even at the cottage!



ART IN THE COMMUNITY: THE AGB IN 2025

New for 2025: We are now selling art supplies, a partnership with The Art Factory in Renfrew! You'll find us at 10 Flint Avenue in Bancroft (just off the main street downtown).

As I write this, I am still euphoric from the outcome of our first major fundraiser, 43!!, celebrating our 43 years as a public gallery. 43!! Featured an online auction of beautiful artwork donated by artists from across Ontario. The auction culminated at a very fun party at the gallery on March 1 which included a Mystery Art Grab. For the Art Grab, we asked 43 artists to each create a 10" x 10" artwork which would only be signed on the back and were hung on the gallery wall in a grid formation. 43 numbered tickets were sold; and when their number was drawn, ticketholders could go up to the wall and remove the artwork of their choosing. Only then would they know whose artwork they had chosen!

For me, the best part of the Art Grab was that people would choose artwork based on their emotional reaction to the piece, rather than because they knew the art-




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Display of 43 works of art for the fundraiser.

ist. I think that's how/why all art should be purchased.

Another "first" for the AGB will be our Artist in Residence program. The chosen artists will be working in the gallery, their studio for the entire month, one in May and another in November. The residency is thematic – for 2025 it is Finding Community. The artists are free to express that in any way and will have a joint exhibition of their work in May 2026. As both artists are from outside our area and represent different demographics, we expect that the resulting artwork will be interestingly varied and nuanced.

Our exhibition year is now well under way, with another interesting and diverse line-up. Many of this year's exhibitions focus on important themes that in one way or another, touch all of us: mental health, the environment, coping with isolation, loss, and grief. Each artist has their own way of expressing these themes, and individually, their work creates engaging and powerful dialogues with the viewer.

In May the gallery will host our first Artist in Residence, Kayla St-Pierre. Kayla is an emerging artist, a recent graduate of the U of Guelph's arts program. Stop into the gallery during regular hours to meet Kayla and see what she's up to!


June brings us the photography of Scott Maracle in an exhibition that shows us the world through his Indigenous eye. The intersection of Indigenous life, the vastness of nature and human impact on the natural world underlie the obvious beauty of the images.

Frank's life will be celebrated at Baptiste Lake in July, and all family and friends are welcome to join. More details will be shared by the family in the coming months.



various partners. It went national in the early 1990s. In 40 years, more than 4000 participants have monitored breeding Common Loons on 4500 lakes. This impressive effort allows us to achieve many important outcomes.

Location: Surveys can be conducted on any lake within the breeding range of the Common Loon. Normally lakes need to be a minimum of 60 acres (24 ha) but you may see loons on clear, smaller lakes, in the prairie regions. To assist your decision, visit tinyurl.com/cllsmap (type or paste into your browser) to see where existing survey lakes are (alternative hyperlink is https://drive.google.com/open?id=19vHvb6SACHLVFMlUot790oa0BQQS-fzz_&usp=sharing). Keep in mind that we welcome additional surveyors on any lake.
