GREETINGS FROM HASTINGS HIGHLANDS

LORRAINE FELL

his summer proved to be one of the best summers on record, and I hope everyone took time to enjoy it. This fall Council is occupied with two important projects: Septage, and how best to dispose of it, and the preparation of a Secondary Plan for the Bird's Creek area. The two are interconnected. Under Provincial Policy guidelines (PPS), future growth and development in HH will depend on having a treatment system to safely dispose of septage from your septic or holding tanks. (the time-frame for allowing septage spread on the fields is limited)

Bird's Creek is currently designated a Rural Hamlet. It is a natural area for expansion of commercial and residential development. However, the Province requires a Secondary Plan for community growth to occur, so that this area can be re-designated as an Urban Hamlet. Without an Urban designation, development/growth in Bird's Creek will be limited. Both these projects are time-consuming, with many obstacles to overcome in the process.

After looking at various methods of treating septage, we have chosen the Dewatering Trenches System developed by the Ministry of Environment (MOE): "Dewatering systems have been in use in Northern Ontario since 1970. Due to the lack of spreading sites, and or the lack of sewage treatment plants with capacity to treat hauled sewage in some areas of the Province, it was necessary to develop a method of treating hauled sewage that was economical, effective and practical." Sewage treatment plants are not only very expensive, the residue sludge still has to be trucked and spread 'somewhere.' Whereas the trench system seems especially suited to rural municipalities, since over 1000 of these systems are now operating in Ontario. Thus, we are in the process of choosing an appropriate site that will comply with all MOE criteria for a Certificate of Approval to operate this system.

According to MOE: "Dewatering trenches are in

essence exfiltration systems. They act as a controlled contact area for surface infiltration. The purpose is to slowly introduce the liquid portion to the soil so that the soil bacteria can effectively treat the liquids in the aerated zone." (For more info on this topic, please see "To Whom it May Concern in HH" on our Web site. Further details received from MOE on the system/operation will also be on the Web site shortly.)

Two new employees have been hired: Jake Krupa as Transportation Manager to replace Wayne Olmstead who retired, and Dave Robb, as Waste and Facilities Manager to look after the Landfill sites, Community Facilities, Parks & Rec. and manage the new Septage Waste System.

Road reconstruction in the budget this year was approved for the North Baptiste Lake Rd.—from the Landfill to Hwy. 62. Reconstruction has commenced; the road will be left to settle this winter, with paving to be completed next spring. Residents who drive up to the lake this winter are reminded not to park in areas designated for snow-plough turning, as it makes life difficult for our men driving the plough!

Mayor Emond has received 3 responses to his request for people with a business background to sit on an Economic Advisory Committee. Meetings will only be held in season to allow summer residents to take part if they wish. Interested residents should send a brief resume of their background to Hastings Highlands c/o Mayor Emond.


Quite a tall order!

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Shoreline Shrub Planting Program

he BLA wants Baptiste Lake to be the healthiest lake in Ontario. We are providing easy and affordable access to a Shoreline Shrub Planting Program for 2012. Shrub bundles provide indigenous species for naturalizing shorelines. Advantages keeping the soil from being silted out into the lake, thus reducing clarity, and denying geese access to the property, reducing goose excrement in Baptiste Lake. The planting of Upland Shrubs beyond the shoreline is an extra gain on naturalising and saving the shoreline.

The Bancroft Area Stewardship Council and the Bancroft Area Forest Industry Association facilitate the acquisition of over 15,000 of these shoreline plants each year. The cost is subsidized through donations and contributions from forest industry partners. The planting of native shrubs along the shoreline is critical to the rehabilitation of the Baptiste Lake shoreline. Lakeshore residents are encouraged to take full advantage of this generously funded program, which is supported by the Ministry of Natural Resources.

Shoreline Bundles:

Alternate and Red Osier Dogwood, American Elderberry, Nannyberry, American High Bush Cranberry.

Upland Bundles:

Sumac, Hawthorne, Black Chokecherry, Juneberry, Service berry, Pin-cherry

SHRUBS:

- \$25.00 per bundle
- 25 native plants per bundle in each of the upland or shoreline bundles

- mixture of listed species in each of the Shoreline or Upland bundles
- shrubs are bare root stock, generally 12" 24" in height, species are labelled, and bundles are packaged for ease of transportation.

BLA LAKE PLAN UPDATE

he Lake Plan implementation is being launched over a three-year period. Activities began in the spring and summer of 2011, with a workshop with the mayor and council members of Hastings Highlands Municipality held on June 29th. Its theme was "Working Together for Mutual Benefit". The Council is very supportive of our efforts, and undertook to work with us on matters of mutual concern.

The Lake Plan involves almost 50 individual projects, divided into five areas: (1) the Lake; (2) the Shoreline; (3) the Viewscape and Watershed; (4) the Built Environment; and (5) Community Action. From discussions during the stakeholders' meetings leading to the Lake Plan, and from reaction at our AGMs, it is apparent that some issues are of high priority at the moment – water quality and shoreline restoration are two such issues, so we started there. John Jared and Frank Hicks are taking on a project that looks at monitoring water quality to measure the health of the lake over time. Bob and Bryn Weese are analyzing the impact, both environmental and economic, of fishing derbies on the lake. Burt Clarke is looking into the possibility of establishing speed limits for boats in narrow waterways. Peter Oliver is undertaking a project to provide public education on shoreline preservation and restoration. Pauline Hawkes is developing a shoreline shrubs planting program, in co-operation with the local Stewardship Council. A "Shoreline Advisor" program is

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underway. Chris Chhatwal is leading a project to inventory and water-test streams flowing into Baptiste Lake.

Some projects are underway in other areas as well. Byron Kellar is investigating the lack of public amenities in the community, such as a beach, a community centre, and a public toilet. Wally McColl is looking into the possibility of developing a nautical map of Baptiste Lake.

In 2012 we will focus on the built environment and the viewscape/watershed, while continuing our activities in other areas. It is our objective to make Baptiste Lake the healthiest lake in Ontario. It is important to pare this work down to "bite-sized" pieces, so that no individual is asked to do too much. We need your help in order to achieve this You can review the Lake Plan on our website to see what activities you might be interested in.

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

Fish Netting Results

Fish populationswere surveyed using large and small mesh nets to provide information on fish species present and their characteristics, such as growth, age and abundance. The catch data below show that 9 species (from a total of 135 fish) were surveyed in large mesh nets. Additional fish species that were caught in small mesh nets are black crappie, bluegill, common shiner, golde n shiner and largemouth bass.



About the Program

The Broad-scale Monitoring Program provides information for managing our fisheries effectively. This bulletin provides a snapshot of the recent monitoring activities and netting results. Netting is conducted using large and small mesh nets. Large mesh nets contribute information about fish species and smallmesh nets describe the fish community. 

Proportion of Fish Caught in Large Mesh Nets






Length Distribution of Lake Trout

The size of lake trout ranged from 51 to 69 cm (from a total of 5 fish) and the size of walleye ranged from 27 to 58 cm (from a total of 3 fish).

Water Chemistry and Temperature

Water samples were collected in May 2011 and sent to the Ministry of Environment for analysis. Water temperature, oxygen levels and water transparency were measured in August 2011. Baptiste Lake is considered a cold-water lake that can support cold and cool-water fish species such as lake trout, walleye, and lake herring.

Invasive Species

Invasive species were monitored using plankton nets and observations made by field crews. Historically, there have been no reported occurrences of invasive species in Baptiste Lake. Samples are currently being processed to determine if any new invasive species were detected through this sampling program. Any species new to Ontario or an invasive species that is a new record for a waterbody is reported to the Invading Species Hotline www.invadingspecies.com.

Fish Contaminants

Levels of contaminants in fish flesh (e.g. mercury, PCB's, mirex, organochlorine pesticides and other organic chemicals) will be reported in the *Guide to Eating Sport Fishing in Ontario* or visit ontario.ca/fishguide.

BANCROFT TRAIN STATION & MINERAL MUSEUM

or over a year, a group of community members have been working together to develop plans and raise funds towards the restoration and rebuilding of one of our community's most important landmarks, the Bancroft Railway Station. Now, Operation "All Aboard" is moving full steam ahead! In celebration of Bancroft's 150th anniversary, the Bancroft Sesquicentennial Heritage Project is breathing new life into the Station.

In addition to being a major lumbering centre at the turn of the century, the Bancroft area was known for its many mines and minerals that were extracted from the area - the Childs Mine, Irondale, Coe Hill, Tory Hill, the Bessemer Mine, Baptiste Lake, and many other sites. Built in 1900, the "Old Station" played a

significant role in the history of Bancroft and North Hastings until the railway was closed in 1975. From the south, the Central Ontario Railway made its way north from Prince Edward County to Bancroft and beyond to Maynooth, Lake St. Peter and Wallace. The Irondale Bancroft and Ottawa Railway connected Bancroft with Kinmount, Ontario. In a bid to exploit the expected mineral wealth of the Haliburton Highlands, it went through some of the roughest geography of Central Ontario.

Since the station closed in 1975, it has been the home of the much acclaimed Bancroft Mineral Museum, with its world-renowned mineral collection, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Art Gallery of Bancroft. When the Station was finally condemned five years ago, it was a loss to

the entire community.

Plans for the new building were originally designed by local designers Larry Haight of Compudraft, and later, Pat Marcotte of Havencraft Homes. Architect Christopher Tworkowski has done the final drawings. The building has been lifted off of the original, rotting

foundation, excavation has been done, and it now sits on stilts high above the ground, waiting for a new ICF foundation. The main 2- storey section of the Station will be restored, the freight shed and residence at the back removed and the shed

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
rebuilt. There will be a full basement under the entire building and it will be universally accessible for everyone in the community to enjoy. The new facility will provide a much needed new home for the Bancroft Mineral Museum, Regional Tourist Information Centre, Chamber of Commerce and a Mineral Education/community space in the lower level. The facility will open in the spring of 2012.

More than \$600,000 has already been raised towards the project, including \$345,000 from the Canadian Heritage Fund, cash donations

and donations of labour. The land and building have been donated by the Town of Bancroft. Another \$300,000 is needed to achieve something of which we can all be proud. Donations of cash, labour and materials are welcome. As well, old-fashioned Work Bees will be organized at various stages of construction and volunteers are welcome. The first one, in July, saw several experienced local contractors joining with other community members to dismantle the baggage shed, with a great lunch provided by the Committee. Another is planned soon to lay the footing forms and get the cement flowing!



n my opinion, few things in life are better than this: sitting on your front deck looking out onto the water, feeling the warmth of the sun and hearing a gentle breeze rustling through the trees. Now that's a great day at the cottage.

Great cottage views are not always 'born'—sometimes they must be created or nurtured. Trees often create that "special place" feeling, but they can also obstruct our scenic views.

As a certified arborist* I talk to a lot of shoreline owners about site lines and vistas. People want the sunlight and the view, but they don't want to create an unnatural look by "stripping" the bottom limbs or one whole side of a tree. Many cottage owners don't realize that there are options other than tree removal. Sometimes a good prune by a trained hand is all that is required.



Site line pruning is a technique used by arborists to capture specific desired views while minimizing and/or eliminating the negative effects of whole tree removal. By leaving trees standing, many benefits are retained: shade and privacy, habitat for animals, wind and snow block, energy savings, aesthetic and increased property value. Imaging keep all that, plus gaining a view!

In my experience the key to a great site line pruning is good communication between the arborist and the client. Specific desired views should be discussed. ("Is a view of the island achievable?") Goals should be set and agreed upon by all involved. I always tell my clients that subtle and natural solutions always look the best. For example, reduce the length of a limb instead of removing it completely. When done expertly, site line pruning is almost invisible; you see the view, not the cuts.

HOSPICE NORTH HASTINGS

ospice North Hastings has been providing care and support to individuals with terminal or life threatening illnesses and their families for the past 14 years. Trained volunteers provide respite and support care in the home as well as Grief and Bereavement Support programs. A Lending

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Library and a large M e d i c a l Equipment Loan Cupboard, which has served over 400 clients this past year, provide education and support.

Four years ago the Hospice House for North Hastings opened and was the first "Rural Residential Hospice" in Ontario, providing

24/7 "end of life" care to individuals and support for their families. This "Showpiece of Community Spirit" was purchased, renovated and has operated, at no charge to individuals or their families. This success has been possible because of the generosity of the North Hastings communities. This model has become the model of choice for rural hospices in Ontario. The Hospice House for North Hastings has never received funding dollars from the government.



Hospice House receives financial support from several sources.

- 1. **Contributions** named "in Lieu of Flowers" by the families of those who have used the Hospice House.
- 2. All Occasion Event Rentals, owned and operated by Hospice House. At present, profits are used to grow the rental inventory, but in the near future 100% of the profits will fund Hospice programs.
- 3. **Memorial Doves**. During the Christmas season volunteers are available at our local banks and a number of stores where they place Doves on Christmas Trees for a Memorial Donation.
- 4. **The Hospice Gala** is held annually in the spring with over 340 people attending.
- 5. North of 7 Film Fest is a partnership with a division of the TIFF (Toronto International Film Festival). Movies are shown at the Bancroft Village Playhouse on the second Tuesday of each month, 4 & 7 pm, Sept to June and also on the fourth Tuesday in February and March. Check the Hospice Facebook site for movie names and times at "North of 7 Film Fest". Tickets available at the door and for the week prior to the show at Ashlies' Books, Hospice, Ink N'Things, Posies & Zihua. Call 613-332-8014 to reserve tickets.

In my experience, the best results come from site line pruning with the clients on site to direct and monitor progress. If the site line is from the deck, I would have them sit on the deck (I know it's a tough job but someone's got to do it) while I work. From there, they can confirm when the desired view is created.

Since 1964, I have spent summers at the cottage my grandfather built on McAllister Road. In the late 60's my grandfather, his brother-in-law,

and his nephews started building a small cabin with logs that they pulled out of the lake. This building is now used as a shed and holds many memories.

They created their reputation by building quality wooden boats able to withstand the harsh waters of Canada's lakes and rivers. In 1959, the company relocated to Plain City, Ohio, and was renamed Skiff Craft. There, veteran craftsmen of local Amish and Mennonite communities, custom build each exceptional Skiff Craft boat using their time-honored woodworking skills".

Entre Amis has been in indoor storage for the last five years. The BLA is now selling her as a

fund raiser for our association. Those who are interested can see her at Birch Cliff Lodge near the reaction hall. Our asking price is \$6500 including the trailer.

The Kuder family has expressed a hope that Entre Amis would continue to find a home here at Baptiste. BLA members will receive a 20% discount to encourage that possibility.
